


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JAPAN'S LAST CHANCE?

Is it possible that the countdown has actually begun? Absolutely everything points vividly to the soon return of our Lord Jesus! In His great discourse in response to the question, "Tell us...what shall be the sign of they coming and of the end of the world?" He said, "So likewise ye, when ye shall see all these things, know that it is near, even at the doors" (Matthew 24:33) Every one of His prophecies have been overwhelmingly fulfilled except for the appearance of the Antichrist himself, a and we are all assured that he, too, is about to make his appearance. The stage is all set! Euroland is another astounding additional evidence that is exciting for us to observe! How blessed we are to have God's blueprint found in His glorious Word.

But, my great concern right now focuses on the nation of Japan that is still said to be only 1% Christian even after over 50 years of postwar evangelism. Tragically, it seems that this nation looms almost as an impregnable rock of resistance to the Gospel. Thinking of this, one is forced to recall the parting prayer of Frances Xavier when he was being exiled from Japan. Before boarding the ship he fell on the rocky shores of Kyushu and wept, crying brokenheartedly, "O, Rock, Rock, when wilt thou yield to my Master!"

Nonetheless in all the postwar years we still have not seen the breakthrough. 1997 church statistics reported in the Christian Shinbun in April, 1998, that astounded me and that I simply have not been able to overlook or forget. None of us should! It should cause all of us to fall on our knees in agonizing intercession and concern, asking the Lord of the Harvest to show us where we are missing the mark. The report stated that here are approximately 8000 churches in all Japan and that in 1997 only 4000 souls had been won to Christ--an average of one per two churches! In addition, the report stated that the average attendance dropped one person per church which meant that 8000 had dropped out of church!

Is this not extremely disconcerting ? Should we not become very concerned and begin to cry out to God to show us where we are failing? This is especially so when we hear about what God is doing in many other places around the world. The worldwide reports are almost staggering. Listen! That same Christian Shinbun report stated that in 1997 five million souls came to Christ in China and three million in Brazil! We have all heard of similar moves of God in various other parts of the world, such as Russia, Argentina, Singapore, parts of Africa. Truly we are living in the last days, the very days that Joel foretold 2400 years ago, "And it shall come to pass afterward, I will pour my Spirit on ALL flesh." Oswald J. Smith said "afterward" here focuses specifically on the end times, which is now. What an exciting time to be alive!

But what about our beloved Japan? Could it really be that time is running out? Personally, I am convinced that it is, possibly within the next two years, certainly not much more. The end of the world as we have always know it is fast approaching. The "end times" are here! Jesus is coming soon! What about Japan's millions? Do you not yearn passionately to see multiplied millions in this land swept into the kingdom? I can't bear to think this nation might be bypassed!

Beloved, there is absolutely no doubt whatsoever that God wants to bless Japan to the extent He is now blessing other nations around the world. Furthermore, the promise of Joel 2:28 clearly states that Japan is included. Please note again that awesome prophecy-and rejoice! The phrase "all flesh" is stunning, for it means every nation, every tribe and every people--a worldwide revival!

Yes, and Japan, too. Hallelujah! What a word of encouragement and challenge.

But let us move on. Note the conditions that God also specifies in the verses preceding this glorious promise of end time revival. In verses 12-

17 we read, "Therefore also now, saith the Lord, turn ye even to me with all your heart, and with fasting, and with weeping, and with mourning; and rend your heart...and turn

unto the Lord your God Blow the trumpet in Zion, sanctify a fast, call a solemn assembly: gather the people, assemble the elders....Let the priests, the minister of the Lord, weep between the porch and the alter, and let them say, 'Spare thy people O Lord, and give not thine heritage to reproach, that the heathen should rule over them: wherefore should they say among the people, Where is their God?"

This is a divine summons! God is calling us to fast and pray for Japan's millions! Literally, the very destiny of millions hinges on our immediate and full response to this heart-rending call from the heart of God Himself. He cannot coerce us to obey. Not can He pour out that blessing which will usher countless precious souls in to the kingdom of God without our obedience. This will come only through human instrumentality, as we can see powerfully demonstrated in the time of Jeremiah when God could not find even one man who would stand in the gap before Him for hi people. Again, listen to these words of anguish that poured from the very heart of God in Ezekiel 22:30, "An I sought for a man among them (the nation), that should make up the hedge and stand in the gap before me for the land, that should not destroy it; but I found none. Therefore I have poured out my indignation on them."

Beloved, please allow me to be blunt. Throughout the decades of the postwar era there have been numerous seminars on evangelism and church planting which are very important of course. Likewise there are annual missionary conferences where

renowned bible teachers come to expound the riches of God's wonderful Word. All of these are very good, but what about Fasting and Prayer Conferences where burdened missionaries gather to intercede with tears and anguish of soul that this nation might

have a mighty visitation from on High?

Have you ever heard of or participated

in any? Do you know what a "solemn

assembly" is? Why are we not re-

sponding to God's clear call? Why

do we not gather in groups across the

entire nation to do precisely what God

has commanded us to do? Is evan-

gelism more important than prayer?

The answer to this, of course, is a

boil, to make known to thine adversaries that the nations may tremble at they presence! When thou didst terrible things which we looked not for, thou camest down, the mountains flowed down at they presence...."

what happened in Korea in his book, When the Fire Fell. The entire nation was inundated with

God is calling us to fast and pray the very presence

of God Himself. Tens of thousands were swept into the Kingdom. There was not a village or city that was not impacted! Yes, just as Isaiah prayed, God Almighty rent the heavens, coming down in all His holiness and glory--- and, happily, that revival blessing continues until this very day.

Beloved, this can...will...happen in Japan too, IF we meet God's conditions. Let's get our priorities right, beginning now...today: united prayer! It is so much easier to be busy in evangelism, but God's way is, first of all, to go to our knees to pray. Yes and to "weep between the porch and the altar" and to continue much in prayer. This is a call for missionaries to unite their hearts in continuous prayer with fasting and weeping as the burden for this perishing nation consumes us.

What will your response be? It is absolutely imperative that you...that we all, pray! It is only as we meet God's clearly defined conditions for revival that the longed-for outpouring will ever come. I plead with you to absolutely, always put prayer first. Persist in believing prayer until that promised outpouring comes here!

great big NO! Before the phenomenal outpouring on the entire nation of Korea soon after the turn of the century missionaries gathered daily at noon in Seoul just to intercede. After a few months, when nothing happened, some said, "We're all very busy so let us stop this gathering to pray every day for revival." Happily, others responded, "No, let's not stop. Let's change the time to 4 pm so we can continue in prayer longer." And they did!

Then it happened! Exactly like Isaiah prayer in Isaiah 64:1-4, "Oh, that Thou wouldest rend the heavens. that thou wouldest come down, that the mountains might flow down at they presence, as when the melting fire burneth, the fire causeth the water to

A Special Gathering for Fasting, Prayer and Praise

srael, in the Old Testament, sought God's help through prayer and fasting in time of national crisis. What about Japan today? The country is materially well off, but it is really a time of spiritual crisis. It is, then, a necessary time for supplication by fasting and prayer.

From January 25 to 27, Japan Campus Crusade for Christ sponsored a "Special Gathering for Prayer and Fasting" at the Yodobashi Church in Tokyo. Participants came from as far as Hokkaido in the north to Okinawa in the south, and from Korea, the United States and other countries. Representing a broad cross-section of the Church in Japan, over 1000 people fervently prayed for the salvation of Japan and the revival of the Japanese Church, as well as for those who are oppressed and suffering from famine and poverty. The theme of the gathering "Heal our Land" was taken from 2 Chronicles

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Among the messengers were Dr. Bill Bright, President of Campus Crusade for Christ International, Dr. Kim Jungong, President of the Korean CCC, Rev. Koji Honda, president of Japan Gospel Crusade, Rev. Kim Sanfan, Rev. Akira Yoshimochi, Board member of JEA, Rev. Park, Chairman of Korean Committee of the 2002 World Cup Soccer Games, Mr. Koichi Doi, member of the House of Representatives, and others from Russia and Nepal.

Rev. Yoshiaki Suzuki, pastor of the Kyoto Evangelical Free Church, said, "Though Japanese Protestants are split into Evangelical and Charismatic camps, I was thankful we could pray together. Numerous evangelists and pastors representing the Japanese Christian community participated. Among them were leaders of organizations and denominations who have been critical of each other in the past. There was a feeling that the gathering might the indication that something new is beginning to happen in Japan.

Rev. Mamoru Kuniyoshi, pastor of the Naha Baptist Church, was clearly impressed, saying that the gathering was profound and wonderful in all that went on. He was very glad to be able to deepen his relationship with God and pray for his neighbourhood and the world. It will surely be the first step towards the revival of Japan, was his comment.

In July 1997, at a similar Conference held in Colorado, Dr. Bright expressed his hope to go and help with evangelising Japan. That desire was realized only one and a half years later. The sponsors of the Gathering

could not help showing their surprise. "We had difficulties, but they were miraculously resolved one by one. It was clearly His will to have this Prayer and Fasting Gathering at this time," said Mr. Kazuyoshi Kurihara, representative of Japan CCC. The Gathering was adjourned after having adopted the Declaration expressing a commitment to mutual prayer and collaboration until His Coming.

300 Korean Christians Attend Prayer and Fasting Conference

More that 300 Korean students paid their own expenses to come and participate in the Prayer & Fasting Conference. During the well-attended evening gatherings that were open to the public, they willingly moved to the basement of the church to make room for other guests, praying and participating via television monitor.

One student said, "Once, while I was praying, I got an vision of God hugging Japan. I learned that He loves this country. It showed me that it was I who had to learn to love Japan more. I believe that is why I an here. I believe that the God who brought revival to Korea will surely do the same thing in Japan."

According to a Korean CCC staffer, this experience helped the young people enlarge their prayer world, learning to pray not only for themselves but for all people. Another student expressed that he has become interested in the evangelism of Japan. The Japanese are materially wealthy, but poor in spirit, was his impression. He would like to aid Japan in it spiritual need.

During the Conference, the young people also established ongoing team prayer-chains, maintaining a round-the-clock prayer vigil throughout the entire gathering.

Special Days of Prayer

for the Church and the Advancement of the Gospel

"We do not know what to do, but our eyes are upon thee."

Il Chronicles 20:12b, RSV

At the recent JEMA Leadership Consultation and Plenary session we discussed the question, "As we approach the new millennium just what can we as missionaries do to assist the Church in its prophetic role of bringing the Gospel of the only God in Jesus Christ to the Japanese?" What can we actually do to assist the church in experiencing and proclaiming the power of the Gospel? Would our best efforts center around giving money, or lending personnel to the church, holding more special evangelistic meetings, forming committees to explore and create new strategies? Is it a matter of us working harder, redoubling our efforts, and believing in God for more? Or is the answer a ceasing from striving in these ways and seeking His purposes for His people?

Those attending the Leadership Consultation and the Plenary season believed that one of the best responses to support the church as we approach the new millennium is to gather together quarterly in special times of concerted prayer to intercede for the church. This will be a time to express our quiet desperation before the Lord, not that He has failed but that we as His church need help. We need grace. We, who have already received grace upon grace in Christ Jesus, are actually in need of more grace. Not that God has been insufficient in any way but we have been insufficient as His people in understanding His person, His power and His sufficiency. It is fitting that we should pledge ourselves to gather like this, as prayer is the surest sign of dependency on our Master and He is honored by our dependency, not our independence.

The Proposal

We as missionaries have pledged ourselves to seek God for the building up of the body of Christ and the advancement of the Gospel IN PRAYER.

A Word about Concerted Prayer

The concerted prayer is designed not so much to gather God's people to convince God that something must be done, but to humble ourselves and seek the very thing that His word says He wants to and indeed intends to do among His people and in His world. Grasping this understanding of prayer can revolutionize our thinking about the meaning of the phrase 'seek the Lord'. We are not coming to a reluctant God who must be swayed with our petitions, rather we are coming to the Sovereign God and Father that we might prepare our own hearts to speak and agree with what He knows is best for us as His people. Prayer has everything to do with the changing of our hearts to the divine will, preparing the creature's heart for the blessing of the Creator. It has much to do with conforming us to the image of Christ and thinking God 's thoughts after Him. That is why these quarterly days of prayer are so important. It is a time for us to cease from our individual ministries and quiet ourselves before God and seek His mercies and grace for His saints. Jonathan Edwards wrote, "That which God abundantly makes the subject of His promises, God's people should abundantly make the subject of their prayers." This will be the purpose of our concerted prayer times.

An Action Plan

Because Christ is worthy of all glory and honor, we are calling on missionaries to begin to attend special quarterly prayer meetings for the express purpose of asking the Lord to move in our midst, to build up His church and advance the Gospel. These meetings

will be held in the first week in the months of July 1999, October 1999 and January 2000. Let me encourage you to make plans to attend one of these meetings by calling the area coordinator listed below who is nearest you. If those listed are too distant and you know of missionaries who are a reasonable distance from you, please consider starting a group yourself.

The



he above quote is how Toyohiko Kagawa is described in Inglehart's A century of Protestant Christianity in Japan, Tuttle 1959. In the early decades of this century he was to be Christianity's chief bridge into a world

almost unknown to its other leaders. During his days as a student in the Kobe Theological Seminary, he had often crossed the deathline that separated respectable Kobe from the undescribable slums of the Shinkawa section. In 1909 at Christmas, he shouldered his few belongings and moved into 2 tiny 6 foot cubicles in one of the long huts. He traced the desperate condition of the slum-dwellers to the fact that they had no corporate voice in dealing with employers. When dock workers went on strike he was imprisoned. In the ensuing labour and rural movements on a national scale Kagawa continued to take an active part. Almost alone among the Christians he consistently remained free from extremes;

never surrendering his position of active resistance to social injustice and never giving up hope of the church or leaving it for more radical programmes. Among other activities, he established Rural Gospel Schools, led evangelistic campaigns, headed a movement called the Million Souls movement, promoted cooperatives and pawnshops, enlisted seekers as Friends of Jesus, was a member of a group sent to America to avoid war, and despite being arrested during the war, assisted the Japanese premier in the months succeeding the end of the war. Below is a brief account of Kagawa's childhood and conversion taken from a "Kazokurenai" page of "Saiwai na Hito", for September 1998.

お父さんとお母さんがそろって子どもの生まれるのを待ち望む…それは、当たり前のように聞こえるかもしれませんね。でも、ある人たちったとえば豊彦一にとっては、当たり前ではなかったのです。

明治21年7月10日、神戸市にある運送屋の店主賀川純一と芸者のますえとの間に男の子が生まれたとき、それはむしろひとつの苦しみの始まりでもありました。「なんだ、おまえなんかめかけの子どもじゃないか」。豊彦は生まれたときから、みんなにつらいことばを投げかけられて 育ちました。しかも豊彦がまだ4歳のときにお父さんが亡くなり、後を追うように2ヵ月後にはお母さんも亡くなってしまったのです。まだ小さかった豊彦は、親戚の家に引きとられましたが、家でも学校でもみんなに冷たく扱われ、いつもぼつんと一人ぼっちでした。「ぼく、もう死んじまいたい!」豊彦はずっとそう思っていましたが、そのことを話す相手すらいませんでした。

豊彦は中学に入ってから、つらいことを忘れるかのように一 生 懸 命勉強に打ち込むようになりました。とくに彼が興味を持ったのは英語でした。ちょうどそのとき近くに教会がせんきょうしあってアメリカ人の宣 教 師が英語を教えているから行ってみないかとさそわれたのです。

「ただで英語を習えるならら…」、豊彦は夢中で教会に通い始めました。毎週の英語の クラス**の他に**も、ほとんど毎日のように教会に行ってわからないところを聞きました。その うち聖書の勉強会にも出るようになり、いつしか英語よりも聖書そのものにひかれていっ たのです。

「トヨヒコさん、困ったことがあったら、何でもワタシに言っていいんですよ。ワタシたちはお友だちです」「ワタシは毎日あなたのために祈っています」「悲しいことがあるならせんきょうしてスさまの前で、ワタシと半分ずつ分け合いませんか?アメリカ人の宣教師マヤス先生はいつもやさしく豊彦を包み込むようでした。両親からも兄弟からも友だちからもやさしくされたことのなかった豊彦は、この先生といっしょにいるだけであたたかさとのびのびとした喜びを感じることができるのでした。

愛するお友だち、だれかに神さまのことを伝えるなんて、とてもむずかしく思えるかも しれませんね。でもあなたのとなりにも、きっと悲しい思いやさみしい思いをしているお友 だちがいるはずです。あなたもそういうお友だちの悲しみを半分にしてあげられませんか。

Family Focus Japan is a nonprofit, interdenominational Christian organization operating under The Evangelical Alliance Mission. Our purpose is to permeate the Biblical understanding of the family among the Japanese people and to spread the gospel of Jesus Christ by means of strengthening Japanese families worldwide. We are an affiliate of James Dobson's FOCUS ON THE FAM-ILY, USA, and operate as an independent entity. There are affiliate offices in fifteen countries including Korea, Taiwan, Malaysia, Philippines, and Indonesia.

From the Prayers of Christian Businessmen

An embryo of Family Focus japan was formed when two Christian businessmen (Mr. Kaneko and Mr. Itoh) in the Yokohama area started praying in the late '80s that God would use them in some way to help the Japanese family and churches in general. Shortly after paying a visit to Dr. Dobson in 1994, they formed the Steering Committee of Family Focus Japan with other like-minded Christians, whose members still serve on a voluntary basis to this day.

Tsuneo Maejima, the Office Manager, joined as the first paid employee in 1995. Most of the financial needs for the first two years were met by donations from ABLE Co., Ltd., a company run by Mr. Kaneko and Mr. Itoh. Presently, 550 Supporting Friends, most of whom are pastors and missionaries, give regularly to the ministry. We need at least 2,000 faithful do-

nors to successfully run the present operations. YOU can become a supporting friend (a member) by paying an annual fee of 2,000 yen. Members

receive a discount on all of our items. The main office is in Nagano City, while ABLE serves as a Yokohama office. Presently, we are looking for volunteers who are able to help out with editing and designing at the Yokohama office.

Resources For Families

We have been distributing a quarterly "FAMILY FOCUS MAGAZINE" (20 pages; 7,000 circulation; 1000 yen subscription per year) since February 1996. As we have been unsuccessful, so far, in launching effective radio programs, this periodical remains the only tool of communication to our constituents. But, we are getting very encouraging responses from the subscribers. The most popular columns are the "Media Report" and "Solid Answers" by Dr. Dobson.

Our Resources in Japanese include 6 volumes: FOCUS ON THE FAMILY video series (Japanese); Sex, Lies, & the Truth video (Japanese subtitles); Dr. Dobson's books WHEN GOD DOESN'T MAKE SENSE; HIDE OR SEEK. The video series "THAT THE WORLD MAY KNOW" and "LIFE ON THE EDGE" will be marketed this year. (To order, please see our ad for details). Dr. Dobson's book WHAT WIVES WISH THEIR HUSBANDS KNEW ABOUT WOMEN will be released in 2000. (The translated work by Word of Life Press is now out of print).

Free counselling service on family issues is offered through phone,

mail and e-mail. The phone line is open 8 am - 5 pm Monday through Friday. Many hurting families have contacted us over the past year. Problems range from marital discord to adolescent delinquency to pornography. For English speakers, Tim Cole (International liaison) and Jonathan Benedict (Missionary liaison) are offering counselling help in the midst of their busy schedules.

Family Camp is planned in July 1999 in conjunction with the alumni association of KGK. The featured speaker will be Dr. Takashi Bano.

CONSTITUENTS RESPOND

One woman called to ask for resources, and shard why she has become interested in family issues. Since childhood she has been verbally and emotionally abused by her own father. She has read numerous books on education and Christian child-rearing published in Japanese, but few have been found satisfying. Gary Smalley and James Dobson are exceptions in the sense that they clearly point out that the key is the father's leadership at home. We feel that more people would call us if we had a full time counsellor ready.

One pastor said, after reading WHEN GOD DOESN'T MAKE SENSE, "Other books which I have read so far dealing with the same topic [suffering of believers] contain a grain of truth in them, but are not quite thorough in their approach. I hesitated to give these books to my friends who were experiencing pain in their lives. But this book by Dr. Dobson I can recommend wholeheartedly to those who are suffer-

Temptations are still great. Understanding and prayerful support from people around me are indispensable for keeping my secondary virginity."

A mother of three who offered to serve as a volunteer monitor for the magazine, wrote, "Husbands, Protect Your Wives" (Dr. Patrick McElligott) became a discussion starter between me and my husband. (Dr. McElligott shares and episode where a high school boy beats his mother just because supper was a few minutes late, and his father is absent from home both physically and emotionally.) My husband admits that the typical Japanese husband does NOT feel compelled to protect his wife from their abusive children. I pray that this article will be a wake-up call for "absent-minded" husbands. I would appreciate articles that will encourage women readers. Anyway, hang in there, Family Focus Japan. We are here for you!"

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"EXCEPT A GRAIN OF WHEAT

ome on over here and listen to a message from the Bible. It'll only take 10 minutes. You can put your paint thinner-sniffing bag down that long, can't you?"

Half-joking comments pepper his coaxing invitations, but Yasuhiro Kanazawa, 35, is deadly serious about the reason he's standing on the street corner this Saturday night. It may be just another endless evening of cruising around downtown East Osaka for these teens, but he knows the reality of the hopelessness most of them live in.

With left hand resting on his open Bible and in descriptions readily understandable to them all, Kanazawa begins to address a small group of these social "bad apples" clumped on the sidewalk in front of him. A missing left pinky finger – chopped off at the second joint – draws their attention like a magnet and fires real curiosity about what could have happened to change this ex-Yakuza gangster so radically.

Now pastor of Disciple Church in Osaka's Ikuno Ward, Yasuhiro Kanazawa and wife, Chiyoko, were guests on Harvest Time in February and told the story of their long journey from darkness to light – and the vision of Grace that God has now given them.

Born of Japanese-Korean ancestry, Kanazawa says that his father and grandmother had been strong Christians all their lives and that he and his younger sister had gone to church regularly throughout childhood. However, by the time he got to high school, he said, his friends in the motorcycle gang had begun to replace his Christian home as the main influence in his life.

"Several of these motorcycle gang friends of mine would come over wearing nice clothes and flashing their money around," he said. "When I asked them where they got it, they told me that they were Yakuza members. It sounds foolishly simple to me now, but from the moment I heard that, I made up my mind to become a Yakuza gang member."

Within a short time, 18-year-old Kanazawa was a full-fledged member of an organized crime group. He and his girlfriend from the motorcycle gang days, Chiyoko, moved in together and by the

time he was 19, he was a father. However, he said, instead of concentrating on his new family, he sent them to live with his parents while he lived and worked at gang headquarters.

Sports betting, loan sharking, fighting, a full upper body tattoo, cutting off his own finger over a point of gang honor – Kanazawa went deeper and deeper into the Yakuza underworld. But by the time he had been in for 10 years, he said, things weren't going nearly as well as he had hoped.

family to Tokyo. After some initial difficulties in finding work, he finally got on at the grilled beef restaurant owned by his father's brother. His uncle, determined to help him make a new start, encouraged him to learn the business and work toward the goal of someday operating his own restaurant.

With a steady job and a goal to work for, Kanazawa began to enjoy family life for the first time. Then suddenly, for no apparent cause, his father collapsed and was rushed to the hospital. This long-

An endless series of confrontations with rival gangs and police had him wearing a bulletproof vest everyday and unable to go anywhere alone. Plus, his personal gambling debts had begun to increase dramatically.

The situation began to become unbearable for both of them, since Chiyoko was working full time and trying to care for their (by that time) three children. "We both came to the conclusion that it would be better to try to make it on a shoe-string – just the five of us on our own – than to try to keep going the way we were," he said.

Kanazawa left the gang and moved his

suffering, praying father of his – who had always been in good health – was suddenly at the brink of death at the age of 63. Kanazawa was devastated.

"There is no God!" Kanazawa bitterly declared. "And no hope, either!" Just as this black despair began to envelope him, a friend of his father's reached out to him with just the right words: "Yasuhiro, let's go to church."

He and his younger sister went together with this family friend to church – just like when they were children. Feeling like prodigals come home, they sang familiar hymns, prayed with the church members, and began to receive some much-needed

rest in their souls. From that place of rest, Kanazawa said that a deep conviction of sin and a genuine repentant heart began to grow within him. And the words from the pastor's sermon hit him like a ton of bricks:

"Jesus was nailed to the cross to atone for the sins of every one of us. Through His sacrifice, our sins were completely forgiven...'Their sins and lawless acts I will remember no more' (Heb. 10:17)."

That was enough. Both Kanazawa and his sister confessed Christ as Savior that day. So powerful was the observed

featured the Kanazawas' work in recent news broadcasts.

Unfazed by the media attention, his focus is fully on the seriousness of Japan's growing youth problems and, he says, proclaiming the Gospel and serving God and people is the answer.

"I'm here today because the prayers of my father and grandmother carried me from the place of an 18-year-old hoodlum just entering the world of organized crime to where I am now. Indeed, my father laid down his life so that my entire family could come to Christ."

peace in the lives of both of them, that soon his mother, wife, and all three of his children also received Christ as Savior. They were all baptized together.

The father who had been hanging onto life so precariously passed away three days later. Kanazawa realized that through this incomprehensible illness, his father had been a "grain of wheat" (Jn. 12:24) for the whole family's salvation. The funeral was painful, but now real peace was in their lives to stay.

Kanazawa moved his family again, this time back to Osaka, where he had grown up. But soon it began to dawn upon him that God was leading him into the ministry and not into the restaurant business at all.

Against the initial objections of his wife, Kanazawa entered Ikoma Bible School, determined to give his all to follow the Lord. Bible school was a big challenge for a high school dropout like Kanazawa. But, he said, as he disciplined himself to the task, God provided abundant grace for his needs. By the time he began his third and final year of studies, the entire family had moved into married student housing and Chiyoko, as well, had enrolled for classes.

In March of 1997, Kanazawa graduated and received ordination, becoming the full-time pastor of the mission church he had planted a year before in the North Katsuyama area of Osaka's Ikuno Ward—"Disciple Church." With the simple goal of "being and making disciples of Jesus," he and his family work together as a team. Both the TBS network and TV Asahi have

He added, "ANYONE who believes in Jesus can be born again! I'm living proof of that and I'll never stop telling the story." .*



Four Years After The Quake

Cour years have passed since the Kobe Earthquake. Splendid new buildings and houses are appearing along the main streets, giving the illusion that there never had been such a disaster. However, go into the back streets and you find land still left vacant, or temporary housing for the still homeless, or even people still living out of doors. The aged have been placed in apartments, but the loss of their own community has left them in anxiety and loneliness. Some bear great financial burdens and face legal problems after having constructed new homes. Some remain deeply wounded by the lost of their families.

Christians and churches in the area face the same difficulties. How these victims can rise up to show love and share the Gospel with their neighbours under such severe conditions is a major challenge. This is a report to find out how the Christians have dealt with the disaster. There are scars that seem to be incurable, yet it seems that there is some spiritual renewal taken place.

Mrs. Yoko Katagiri, wife of the former pastor of Shinwa Church who passed away at the age of 44 after laboring as a volunteer during reconstruction. She is now a student of theology at Kansei Gakuin University and lives with her parents and 4 children. On January 15, she played the Lead Organ for a charity concert sponsored by the Osaka Disctrict Women's Committee. The owners of the organ lost their home in the earthquake and had to sell the instrument. She played the same pieces she had played for the funeral service of a church member who died in the quake. She desires that many people truly understand what the earthquake brought about. With the passing of time, she became aware of a big change in her own life. The loss of her spouse has allowed her to meet a broader variety of people. After her graduation, she would like to work for people in different circumstances as

she learned a lot from her own experiences.

Pastor Toji Kojima lost his own child in the quake that damaged his part of Kobe more than any other area. This past January 15, he held a prayer meeting at 5:30 am with silent prayer at 5:46, the time when the earthquake occurred. He then did a memorial pilgrimage, stopping in front various "monuments" while praising God, praying and reading the Bible. His church was open the entire day and many came bringing floral tributes. In a Kobe memorial-day message given at the Kobe Jogakuin, he chose Revelation 1:13 as his text. The students listened intently as he stressed that we, who are entrusted with governing the earth, could also fulfill our responsibility of attributing glory to our God in Heaven.

Pastor Mitsuru Nagai is working in northern Awaji Island near the seismic center of the quake. In looking back to the day of the earthquake, he gave a message about what God has taught us through the earthquake, and that we should not forget the help and support received from so many people. He has ministered to a elderly woman who was forced to leave the island with her husband, only to see him pass away soon afterward. He has tried to introduce her to a church in her new area, but it is proving difficult for her to start with a new church.

Rev. Tsuneo Yamatori, is a representative of the volunteer team "No-side," who continue their support for those victims still living in temporary housing. He expressed a desire to work for other homeless and less fortunate in society in addition to helping earthquake victims. He asked his church members to back up that resolution. The winter camp organized by No-Side had about 40 volunteers, including students, working together. He commented that Revival in Japan won't happen unless Christians go beyond the intellectual and truly seek to impact society through practical, tangible, proofs of God's love.



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Webster's Dictionary of the English Language defines mentor as:

- 1. A friend to whom Odysseus, when setting out for Troy, entrusted his house and the education of Telemachus.
- Hence, a faithful counsellor. The concept of mentoring, now in vogue, is being encouraged by both spoken and written word.

Although my experience took place several decades ago, I think you will find the following vignettes inspiring.

We won't find the word mentor in God's Word, but, we do see its power in the shaping of lives and ministries—accomplished through personal observation and close association.

What great mentored Old Testament character comes first to mind? Elisha, for me! It was he whom I Kings 19:21 records, ...took his yoke of oxen and slaughtered them...then he set out to follow Elijah and became his attendant.

These two men walked together, talked together day in and day out. Then, when the LORD was about to take Elijah up to heaven in a whirlwind, Elijah and Elisha were on their way from Gilgal. Elijah said to Elisha, Stay here; the LORD has sent me to Bethel. But Elisha said, As surely as the LORD lives and as you live, I will not leave you....Then just before Elijah was taken away to Glory the inquiry, "Tell me, what can I do for you before I am taken from you?" To which came the plea, "Let me inherit a double portion of your spirit." And, what a prophet Elisha turned out to be (II Kings 2)!

Gentle Ruth was mentored by her mother-in-law, Naomi. Gorgeous Queen Esther was coached, yes, mentored by Uncle Mordecai. These were beautiful

relationships where two persons gave and gained — the learner always increasing in wisdom, knowledge, and experience.

In the New Testament our Master Mentor, Jesus, allowed Peter, James and John to privy holy moments. The other important nine also lived, talked and ate with Him for three special years.

Missionary Paul counselled young Timothy when he wrote, "...Physical training is of some value, but godliness has value for all things..." (I Timothy 4:8). Peter, in his first book chapter 5, urged young men to be submissive to those who were older — watch the older men, imitate them, learn from them. And in Titus 2 Paul challenged older women to the teaching of the younger!

It is not that one becomes a carbon copy of the other, but that the mentored one through faithful counsel — learns. The core issue is, that we take on a striking likeness of the model/mentor. C.H. Spurgeon says, A Christian should be a striking likeness of Jesus Christ. "That LIKENESS," Spurgeon writes, "should be in His BOLDNESS, in His LOVING SPIRIT, and in His HOLINESS—which include His ZEAL, His SELF DENIAL, His PRAYER LIFE, His ENDURANCE, and His FORGIVING SPIRIT!"

As a bran new missionary way back in 1969, my eyes were wide open! I had to find myself here! I had to know my gifts and put them to use. I had to learn my lessons from books, to be sure, but I had to learn from those who knew more than I did, too! I had to see with my eyes how the work was to be done. I had to see hands and feet in motion. I had to see what worked in ministry

see what worked in ministry. Was I being mentored? Well, she didn't know it, neither did I, but it took place! When it came to language, to witnessing, to praying and serving, she more than anyone else showed me how it was to be done. Susan Dyck, Canadian Christian & Missionary Alliance missionary here

from 1953 to 1985, was my precious mentor and how I grew to love and appreciate her. What a woman of passion. What a missionary.


CHRIST LIKENESS IN: BOLDNESS

Boldness has two faces! It can be harsh, unfeeling~~~paralizing, or it can be forceful, feeling ~~~ transforming. Jesus' boldness was the latter. Remember the man living in the region of the Gerasenes? Evil spirits, numbering possibly as many as 6,000, drew this man from the tombs intentionally to meet the holy Nazarene. Jesus spoke a total of 36 power packed words. The man was set FREE (Mark 5)!

The best way to advertise the Gospel's changing power would be if the worst man in town came to Christ, reasoned Susan shortly after arriving on her station, Matsue. Idol worship and lack of receptivity to the gospel was a known fact among missionaries who had ministered there before her. Susan actually knelt before the Lord one day and asked Him to bring the worst man in town to her door. A year later a well dressed Japanese man came to her door and asked, "Is there a priest living here?" Both got right to the point. Susan explained that she and her partner were

missionaries. Yes, they could be of help. Mr. Kodake blurted out, "What is God like?" He was invited in, seated politely and then the explanation began from Genesis to Jesus' death on the cross. When he was asked for his response, Mr. Kodake answered with, Yes, Miss Dyck. I want to receive Jesus! His life was changed forever.

Was Mr. Kodake the worst man in town? Next door neighbor, prosecuting attorney, Mr. Owake privately told Susan that indeed Mr. Kodake was the most dangerous and violent man in Matsue. He was an alcoholic. He was violent. He inflicted harm on his family. Following his last brush with the law, the court informed



him that if he ever stepped over the line again in violent behavior he would be banished from the city, never to return. That was when God led Mr. Kodake to Susan's door, which opened his life to forgiveness, to hope and to life eternal, (A Light to All Japan, Chapter 10). Susan took little time getting seekers to the point of the gospel and then she would ask the question. Susan was bold in ministry. She, as did her Master, gave clear witness to the will of the Father, that all men come to a knowledge of the Truth. Jesus made every encounter an opportunity for change! Susan's boldness was unforgettable.

CHRIST LIKENESS IN: LOVING SPIRIT

Remember how Jesus had time for people? Rich, poor, dead or ill, Jesus got involved with individuals, yes, and even with children.

During our first term of missionary service we lived and ministered in the great city of Kyoto. Susan lived just several hours up the big highway in Nagoya. It was our privilege to go once a month to help her, with communion mostly. Our active little sons, always welcomed lovingly, were a challenge among the pretty prettiest of home decor! (I don't remember the boys breaking anything.) Aunt Susan as they called her, always treated us with such kindness and love! She delighted in serving our little family meals, like fixing vaki niku at her teppan table. And when we stayed overnight she put on the waffle breakfast. Waffles were a Saturday morning special for years up until the last of our four sons went off to college. Our two older sons, Karl and Todd, will never forget, Aunt Susan!

And we weren't the only ones special to Susan. Everyone who came to her home was treated with the same kindness and love. Students came, mothers came, businessmen came, upper class ladies came, no matter who, no matter when — the graciousness of Susan touched hearts and souls. What a wonderful example Susan was to me, and I deeply loved and respected her. I also know that she loved me. Isn't that the way people felt when they had spent time with our Lord? A conversation about a drink of water, changed the

Samaritan woman's life and it was she who brought out the village with, Come, see a man who told me everything I ever did (John 4:29)! And, Jesus took a deep interest in children too as he touched, blessed and announced, For the Kingdom on Heaven belongs to such as these (Matthew 19:13-15). Loving spirits draw you in! Susan got right into my heart, and how I loved her!

CHRIST LIKENESS IN: HOLINESS

Holiness as evidenced in His zeal, His self-denial, His prayer life, His endurance and His forgiving spirit are in holy writ for ALL to see the perfect God Man, walking in harmony with His Father!

It is so refreshing to see a real live person seeking after God with utmost sincerity and humility! I can still hear Susan praying in Japanese. Those prayers were powerful, clear, specific and bold. And we are told that for a long time, as Alzheimer's Disease took over Susan's mind, one thing she could do was PRAY. Her life, holiness in progress, is even now complete as she worships with joy and freedom at Jesus' feet. Susan went to be with her Lord May of 1998, on Mother's Day bringing to a close a life of dedicated service and deep Christian commitment. Her home going also brought and end to her eleven years of AD suffering.

Returning for her second term, Susan found her new place of ministry in Shobara, Hiroshima Prefecture. Working along with a saintly Japanese, Susan found great joy in service. The church, however, was in desperate need of revival and cleansing. Compromise and lack of love turned Susan to prayer only to find that the God who searches all hearts showed her where she needed to change. Revival came in November of that year (A Light to All Japan, Chapter 14).

Story after story, recorded in the recent book written by Eugene Neudorf about Susan's life and ministry, A Light to All Japan, thrilled my heart and I consumed the book cover to cover. There is no time like the present to examine our hearts and ministries. And, someone just may be watching!



"And not for ours only..."

I John 2:12

These five words sound like a throwaway line, an afterthought added like a footnote. Yet, in this small phrase lies the motive for evangelism. Christ, John tells us, is "the atoning sacrifice for our sins." Standing by itself, that could make us self-satisfied, like members of an exclusive club not open to outsiders. Therefore, John reminds us that Jesus Christ died for all mankind "and not for ours only, but also for the sins of the whole world."

"Not for ours only" and we avoid the misapplication of the doctrine of election. "Not for ours only" and immediately we become debtors to an entire world.

For those who believe that phrase, evangelism is inevitable. In the history of Israel as it stands recorded in II

kings 7, Ben-Hada, king of Aram, laid siege against the city of Samaria and the people resorted to cannibalism in order to live. Four lepers deciding that it would be better to die at the hands of the Arameans than to die of hunger went to surrender to the enemy. When those four men came to the camp of Ben-Hada, they found it deserted. God had frightened the Aramean troops so that they fled in the night.

Food lay everywhere in abundance. Such food and in such quantities as they had not seen for years. The lepers stuffed themselves with food and drink, and they were strongly tempted to keep what they had found a secret. But the memory of Samaria with its starving inhabitants came back to their minds.

"We're not doing right," they said. "This is a day of good news and we are keeping it to ourselves. Now let us go and tell the king's household."

The find demanded instant expression and those four lepers became evangelists.

"And not for ours only...." Someone has described evangelism as "one old beggar telling another old beggar where to find food." If we have found in Jesus Christ forgiveness--complete forgiveness--for all our sins, and there is forgiveness enough for all, we cannot in good conscience keep that news a secret.

Evangelism is not being a huckster, a slick salesman peddling religion, more interested in results than in people. It has nothing to do with grabbing someone by the lapels to shove on him a faith that goes no deeper than the shirt pocket. What a grim indictment lodges in the remark, "He witnessed to others; you could tell them by their haggard look,"

Evangelism gets down to this. "Christ is the atoning sacrifice for our sins, and not for ours only...." Whenever I get the opportunity, I want to tell someone else that great news. God is satisfied with the death of Jesus Christ to pay the penalty for my sin, and not for my sin only, but the sin of all mankind.

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
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
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
